By September the regular volunteers grew to include Elizabeth Nielsen, Bee Krantz, Sara Hansen-Walter, Lorraine Madsen, Elaine Christensen, Dorothy Wright, and Eunice Neve.

Dody Johnson organized the first volunteer week in October 1992. The following volunteers joined the

During the time that the Archive was housed at Dana College, the years with the most volunteers were 2002 and 2003 with 59 different people working. The most people volunteered in 2010, when Dana College closed and the Archive had to move out in three days. That year, we had 132 volunteers.

The second highest year was 2018 with 82 individuals. 2019 was still high with 65. However, COVID made a big difference in our numbers. 2023 is now the highest post-pandemic year with 52 volunteers so far. We're hoping to continue that upward swing.

Two of our new volunteers in 2023 were Debbie and Al Henke. They brought old, deteriorating church records from two Danish American churches in Wisconsin. They used our equipment to scan those records. After they put in the labor to complete the scans, they returned home with the original records and digital files, while leaving us a digital copy that can be used by researchers at the Archive. It also serves as an offsite backup if something happens to their records.

Sometimes people only volunteer for a day, but many more commit to volunteering at the Archive over the course of a number of years. Sixty-nine people have volunteered here 10 years or more.

AROUND THE ARCHIVE

Lars Einar Vig (1905-1972)

One of the larger and more frequently used collections at the DAAL is that compiled by Einar Vig, ninth of the thirteen sons of Peter Sørensen ("P. S.") Vig, who was an early president and long-time professor at Dana College and Trinity Seminary in Blair, Nebraska. Born Lars Ejnar Vig in 1905, he would be known by the Americanized form of his middle name, "Einar." Like many of his siblings, he would attend Dana's Academy, which provided a high school level education, although he did not go on to college level. While at Dana, Einar played tennis and was the "long shot specialist" on the basketball team.

Thereafter, he tried his hand at a variety of occupations: farming, raising poultry, electrical and mechanical work, and carpentry. Barbara Beck's 1974 biography of Einar Vig makes it clear that he was very independent-minded and was most comfortable working alone and on his own terms.

As described in that work, Einar moved in 1964 to a small house next to the railroad tracks on North 21st Street in Blair, where his primary activity was genealogical research focused on Washington County with a non-exclusive interest in its Danish inhabitants, a pursuit that continued until his death in 1972.

What resulted is now referred to as "The Vig Collection." This contains tens of thousands of handwritten pages documenting every person that Einar could identify as having lived in Washington County, Nebraska, from the early pioneer days to the 1970s. Using census records, court records, plat maps, histories of the area and newspapers, he created an index based primarily on heads of households, listing their spouses, children, dates of birth and death, spouses of children and burial locations. Most of these index entries, or "Family Sheets" as he called them, also include references to every local newspaper article relevant to the persons and families in question, sometimes with short descriptions of the article's content. An example with explanation is on the following page.

The collection contains box after box of several iterations of these index sheets, showing how Einar compiled and recompiled them over the years as he refined his work.

Einar applied the same attention to the cemeteries of Washington and surrounding counties in Nebraska, putting together lists of burials sorted alphabetically and by date of burial. His data is sometimes more complete than more recent references, no doubt because the stones were not as weathered when he did his work.

Einar used many abbreviations for towns, townships, cemeteries, names of newspapers and so on.

Born in Gormagne, France, Oct 13, 1812. Died Feb 11, 1896 in DeSoto; buried in Blair Cemetery, Block 8, Lot 7

IN THE STACKS

A Danish Christmas in the Mail

The Danish American Archive & Library has over 400 Danish and Danish American periodicals. Nearly seventy of these were Christmas (Jul) publications that various groups and publishers put out yearly during the holiday season. They were often aimed at specific readers or dealt with certain topics or locales. Others were simply any and all things Christmas. The custom of the Christmas issue or annual (Julebøger) continues to this day.

Ved Julelampens Skær (By the Christmas Lamp's Glow) is an ongoing magazine published in Copenhagen that began in 1918. It contains primarily inspiring short stories by various authors and illustrators. The DAAL has a nearly complete collection from 1924-1979. Another example of a general Christmas periodical is in the form of an almanac. Jule-Kalender had a short life from 1885 -1887, and consisted of calender pages, short stories and poems. Interestingly, its editor, Elith Reumert, was a Danish actor and author who later wrote a book

about a journey to America in 1900 (*Min Amerikarejse*).

Many Christmas annuals focused on a particular town or region in Denmark. These had such titles as *Jul i Roskilde*; *Jul i Randers*, and *Jul i Græsneland* (the Danish-German border). The Danes in America also put out magazines for the Christmas season. One of the most renowned, and long-lived, was *Julegranen* (The Christmas

Tree). Published in Cedar Falls, Iowa from 1896 to 1950, this periodical featured devotional articles, and original stories, poems, as well as articles about Danish America. Enok Mortensen, the pastor and historian, wrote of *Julegranen*: "for more than half a century this annual served as an important

religious and cultural depository." The DAAL is fortunate to have a nearly complete collection of this important Danish American publication.

The yearly Christmas publications also focused on particular groups of people. Titles such as

Danske Kvinders Jul (Danish Women's Christmas); Familiens Julebog (The Family's Christmas book); Spejder Jul (Scout's Christmas); Ungdommens

Julebog (The Youth's Christmas Book); and Aldres Julebog (The Old Folks' Christmas Book) are examples from Denmark. They featured a wide variety of articles, stories, poems, songs, and even puzzles and comics. An American example is Yule published from 1945-1961 by the youth and for the youth of the Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church based out of Grand View College in Des Moines, Iowa. It contained inspiring fiction and non-fiction articles for the holiday.

These are just a few of the many examples of Danish and Danish American Christmas publications in the collections of the Danish American Archive & Library. Jul may be the most important season of the year for Danes (as it is for many) and that includes both readers and writers doing their part to make it a blessed season.

FROM THE DANA ROOM

The "Sights and Sounds of Christmas" was the annual holiday celebration at Dana College. Begun in 1973, and held on the first Sunday in December, the event was able to draw as many as 5,000 people to campus. Music, drama, worship, dancing, crafts, shopping, and lots of food filled the day. These events highlighted primarily Dana's Danish and Scandinavian heritage.

The highlight for many was the smorgasbord. The following entry from Dana's centennial cookbook, *Recipes and Reminiscence*, provides a description of the table. [The traditional Danish items marked with a star have recipes in the book.]

The Smorgasbord: A smorgasbord, which can be served at any time of the year, traditionally has a cold table, a hot table, and cheese and dessert tables. Dana's "Sights and

Sounds" cold table can include herring in wine sauce, herring in sour cream, cucumber salad*, beet pickles, cottage cheese, cold sliced ham, leverpostej* (liver paste), smoked salmon, macaroni and gelatin salads, and pickles. Several breads, including pumpernickel, are at the beginning of the hot table. This part of the smorgasbord might feature frikadeller* (meat patties), aebleflaesk* (smoked bacon with apples and onions), rødkaal* (red cabbage), brunede kartofler* (sugar browned potatoes), stuffed roast pork loin, and creamed peas and carrots. The cheese and dessert tables offer a variety of cheeses and a choice of desserts, such as aeblekage* (apple cake), lagkage* (layer cake), or rødgrød med fløde* (red fruit pudding with cream).

Recipes and Reminiscence was prepared by the Dana Women's Club in 1984. Beyond a host of recipes it contains numerous Dana College bios, photographs, memories, events, and quotes from campus publications. The book is so important to Dana's history, and so popular with visitors to the DAAL, that we have had to

regularly reprint and offer it for sale at \$10.00 (or \$15.00 by mail).

From the chapter "Student-Faculty Memories" we include Norman C. Bansen's recipe for aebleskiver. Bansen was professor of English and Danish at Dana College for nearly forty years.

2 cups flour
2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
½ teaspoon salt
3 large eggs, separated
2 cups buttermilk
3 tablespoons butter, melted
Optional: ½ teaspoon cardamom
½ cup raisins

Aebleskiver

Mix dry ingredients, including optional cardamom. Beat egg yolks and add to buttermilk. Add dry ingredients and mix; add melted butter. Add raisins that have been soaked in hot water for a few minutes. Fold in thoroughly beaten egg whites. Bake in an aebleskiver pan generously greased with a mixture of melted butter and melted vegetable shortening over medium heat. Turn baked portion (traditional tool is a knitting needle) in order to bake other half. Serve hot with butter, sugar, applesauce, syrup, or jam.


